Lefty Ray has also done commercial photography for clients like Fly Rod & Reel magazine, Bass Pro Shops, Yak-Gear, Tejano Explosion, Poteet Music Festival, Tejano Music Awards, and for the Surf to Summit Company. His Tejano music photography includes producing images for Tejas Records, Freddie Records, Univision, various independent labels, Academy of Tejano Artists & Musicians, the Tex Mex



Fest Tour, USHCA, KXTN Radio, Tejano Roots Hall of Fame Museum, the State Fair of Texas, and Tejano FM.

His music clients include numerous Grammy and Latin Grammy winners and is the credited photographer on 2 Grammy winning CD's and on a dozen Grammy nominated CD's.

While no longer guiding via kayak at the coast, this year marks the 10th year anniversary of conducting his "Kayak 4 Redfish" seminars. He was the first ACA certified kayak fishing school on the Texas coast. He is also a FFF certified fly casting instructor since 1994 and has been on the G. Loomis Pro Staff since 1995.

Originally from North Texas, Lefty Ray graduated from Texas A&M and moved to San Antonio in the early 80's. For over 30 years he has photographed a variety of subjects in various locales across Texas and the southwest. In his words "It's either get up at 4:30 am or return at 4:30 am."

The nickname "Lefty" comes from his high school

golf team playing days. While actually left-handed he learned to play golf right-handed using his dad's extra set of golf clubs. While the team as a whole was not in the caliber of Tiger Woods, the golf coach was often overheard saying to other coaches that "His team could probably not outplay their team, but his team could out-drink, out gamble, and out-fight any other team in the state of Texas!"

Lefty Ray's slideshow will detail the pre-history and the circumstances that led to the naming of the Guadalupe River over 300 years ago. Also be on the lookout for the Nov/Dec issue of Southwest Fly Fishing magazine as it will contain his feature story on the Guadalupe River.

Lefty Ray will also be offering a clinic on casting after the main meeting that will include many of the practice skills required to cast in many different conditions and the principals to casting longer. President's Letter

Our next general meeting will be held Saturday October 22nd at the Canyon Lake Community Resource Center (CRRC) on the South Access Road in Sattler. Our fisheries committee is monitoring the flows and water temps closely, and will determine the best course of action concerning stocking dates for the trophy trout zone. GRTU Lease Access members will receive notification of the stockings, so be sure to sign up early. Come out to help us with the stockings. It's fun, a great way to meet members and future fishing buddies.

In September, representatives from our chapter will attend Trout Unlimited's annual meeting, held this year in Bend, OR. I look forward to sharing with you what we learn at that gathering. It promises to be an amazing event full of opportunities to share best practices with other chapters and councils.

I am very happy to announce that our own Mick McCorcle won a Trout Unlimited Distinguished Service Award for his many contributions to both our chapter and the national organization. Additionally, Steve Magnelia, long time friend of our chapter, was also honored for his 20 years of service with Texas Parks and Wildlife as the Fisheries Management Biologist for the Guadalupe, was awarded a Trout Conservationist Professional award, a first for a biologist in the state of Texas. He and Mick will be presented with their awards during the annual awards banquet in Bend.

Finally, I wanted to make you aware that all TU chapters and state councils are amending their bylaws during calendar year 2011. The main reasons for this action are to more clearly define our chapter operating procedures, and to protect our nonprofit status.

Our current bylaws state "The bylaws of this Chapter may be added to, amended or repealed in whole or in part by a majority vote of the members in good standing at any regular or special meeting, provided, however, that written notice of the intention to add to, or amend, or repeal the bylaws, in whole or in part, shall have been given each member of record at least thirty (30) days preceding such meeting of the members. However, proposed amendment to these bylaws shall be accompanied by a recommendation of the Board of Directors either for or against this adoption."

Fisheries Report

I am Jimbo Roberts the new V.P. of Fisheries. Some of you know me from seeing me on the river flyfishing. Some know me from our forums and the stories I have written about our fishery and other fishing destinations. One thing for sure I am a flyfishing addict. I will go anywhere to fish for Trout. The 2011-2012 Trout Season is just around the corner and despite the current low flows we are going to have another good Trout fishing on the Guadalupe.

Much has happened since last May. One thing that has changed is the understanding of what is best for our fishery. The prevailing idea that Bigger Trout survive better during the marginal conditions of higher water temperatures during the summer has changed somewhat. I like most people just accepted what we were told that the larger Trout we have been stocking, that is greater than 18", were better suited for making it through the summer as next year's carry-over. After this notion was challenged I began a thorough investigation on my own consulting every possible source, TPWD, TU, Crystal Lake Fisheries, and many nights scouring the internet. What I discovered is the only real studies comparing Trout survivability compares juvenile Trout, less than 4", to adult Trout, at least 12". These studies showed adult Trout had better survival in marginal conditions. I looked for studies that compared say 12" Trout with something larger like 18" Trout. I found no such comparative studies. With this shocking information before me, no scientific evidence that 18" Trout survive better than 12" Trout in marginal conditions, our old argument that we stock larger than normal Trout, averaging about 18", because the carry-over better to the next season no longer holds water.

With this information before us, we sent a poll out to our members to see what would be on their wish list concerning changes to the Lease Access Program. The results of this poll strongly pointed to changing our stocking strategy. Among the changes for this year will be an increase in the numbers of smaller Trout we will stock. For the

past 5 years we have generally been increasing the size of the Trout we stock for what we thought was a possibility of higher carry-over to the next season. Last year the Trout we stocked averaged 18" and therefore many were legal to be harvested by other fishermen the first time they were caught. This year we will be stocking 2 classes of Trout. Crystal Lake Fisheries will be sending us a mix of Rainbow Trout that are: 75% 14-16" and 25% over 18". Since we buy Trout from the hatchery by the pound, the same weight will result in about a 50% increase in the numbers of Trout we stock this year. Another benefit will be the smaller Trout can not be legally harvested in the Trophy Trout Zone which we hope will result in many more Trout caught and released thereby keeping the catchable numbers higher throughout the season. There will still be a sizable population of Rainbows that are over 18" to add to the excitement.

We will also be working on adding additional lease access sites especially upstream of Rio. I hope to secure at least one more site before this season starts. We will continue with online and walk-in lease access orientation classes. Our Lease Access season will be the same as the years before from November 1st through October 31st. We will post notices of stockings on the Lease Access Forum and broadcast e-mail to those members one week before the stocking date. We will be stocking mainly on Saturday's this year so most of those that want to attend can do so. We will be providing a bus again to move those volunteers from site to site for stocking. We have 3 planned stockings totaling 12,000 lbs of Rainbows this year. If conditions improve we may even consider a 4th stocking in the late spring. Also recent increases in costs of Rainbows from \$3.95/lb to \$4.10/lb mean we will need to raise the cost of Lease Access membership by \$10 this year. Still it is the best bargain in fishing out there and I know a thing or two about bargains. For less than the cost of a single day's guided fishing trip anywhere, you can conveniently fish right here in central Texas on our Lease Access Sites that are stocked with our larger Trout, when most other Trout fishermen

are freezing or just dreaming about some Trout fishing. This is "THE BEST DEAL" anywhere believe me!

So what can you expect the fishing to be like this year? Well barring a drastic change in our rain patterns or a stray hurricane coming ashore, we can expect flows to average 50-60cfs. We certainly need the rain, but let's plan on it being the same and be thankful for any increases in flows. NOAA has been monitoring our drought and the La Nina weather pattern that produced it. Even though the La Nina event is official over their latest prediction is that the drought will continue through the winter. So I am still beating the drums and praying for rain hoping that next summer we will get our sustaining summer flows of the Flow Agreement. The good news is wading in these currents will be relatively easy. More Rainbows will be in the river to catch this year, so hopefully everybody's catch rates will be up. These smaller fish also seem more prone to jump, so you can expect to see more frequent and dramatic aerial displays. With these lower flows you will also need longer leaders, lighter tippets, generally smaller flies, and lighter nymph rigs. Hopefully we will also see more dryfly action in the relatively shallower waters. Last year I used only 3 rods on the Guadalupe: a 690XP, a 590XP, and my favorite a 5100 Z Axis to battle our Large Trout in the higher flows. This year I expect we will see a popular return of the use of lighter rods, more 4wts, and even 3wts, will be used with success while the river is not flowing 500cfs. These lighter rods will make our Rainbows feel bigger and be easier on shoulders, elbows, and hands after a full day of fishing. So maybe we will even be fishing more often.

We will also continue our efforts and work to enhance the habitat in the Guadalupe for our Trout. Our big project this year will be evaluating and designing structures which will be put in place along the Pott's stretch of the river to mitigate downstream thermal impacts from what is now the relatively shallow and slow water found there. We will continue our studies and legal preparation

for the upcoming renewal of the Flow Agreement with GBRA. We also have a new TPWD biologist for the Guadalupe River: Marcos DeJesus. I will be coordinating and working with him on what is best for the river and our fishery. Steve Magnelia who moved departments to the TPWD River Systems will still be working with us on what we can do to enhance our fishery. So it's like getting two for one in respect to the minds and ideas available to make the Guadalupe better. We have other projects in the works and will make timely announcements about them and their implementation.

We are doing everything possible to make this a successful and fun season fishing for Rainbows on the Guadalupe. I look forward to seeing everyone at the general meetings, stockings, volunteer projects, and most importantly fishing on the river. I will have an open door policy as GRTU's V.P. of Fisheries. So feel free to talk, call, or e-mail me about anything you wish to discuss concerning our fishery or even your favorite flies and techniques. Let us prepare to fish!

Directions to the Canyon Lake CRRC Recreation Center


>From NORTH or SOUTH: Just North of New Braunfels on I-35 take Exit 191, (Canyon Lake Exit), which is FM 306 and go WEST, about 14 miles to Sattler (Canyon Lake area). Go past the traffic light at FM 2673 in Sattler for about 2 miles, (through Canyon City) and turn Left at the blinking caution light and small road sign marking the South Access Rd. Follow the South Access Road for about two miles, passing below the dam and across the spillway. The Recreation Center will be on your left.

>From the WEST: From US 281, turn EAST on FM 306, which is between Twin Sisters and Spring Branch. Drive about 16 miles to the blinking caution light (just before you enter the area called Canyon City). Turn Right on South Access and follow the directions above to the Recreation Center, which will be on your left.

>From the EAST: From I-10, take SH 46 to I-35. Go North on I-35 to Exit 191 (Canyon Lake Exit), which is FM-306. Go west, (Left), on FM306, and follow the directions for North and South above.

What Is Reel Recovery

Reel Recovery was founded in 2003 by a group of avid fly-fishers, inspired by their fishing buddy's ongoing battle with brain cancer. Witnessing first-hand the beneficial impact fly-fishing provided their friend, they created Reel Recovery to provide the same opportunity for other men battling the disease. Combining expert fly-fishing instruction with directed "courageous conversations", the organization provides men with all forms of cancer a unique opportunity to share their stories, learn a new skill, form lasting friendships and gain renewed hope as they confront the challenges of cancer.

The mission of Reel Recovery is to help men in the cancer recovery process by introducing them to the healing powers of the sport of fly-fishing, while providing a safe, supportive environment to explore their personal experiences of cancer with others who share their stories much like the "Casting for Recovery" is for does Ladies. The Program goals are to provide a safe, reflective environment for the participants to discuss their disease and recovery with other men with shared experiences, thereby providing support and information to help them in their recovery.

To provide expert fly-fishing instruction that enables the participants to learn a new skill, form a healing connection with nature, and participate in a sport they can continue throughout their recovery and lifetime.

Reel Recovery retreats also provide participants information about cancer-related resources, both in the local community and nationally, to facilitate networking and enhanced management of their recovery. This is all accomplished in the setting of three day retreats for the participants and for the last three years we have held the Hill Country Retreat at Joshua Creek Ranch. The friends at JCR are always ready to help in any way they can with the use of their facility and property simply they make the retreat a memorable event for the participants and staff. While

the cost to the participants is free there are still costs associated with putting on this program and it is all done with voluntary donations from people like yourselves.

Reel Recovery relies on a dedicated and growing group of volunteers who assist in coordinating and staffing retreats at the local level. The experience can be powerful and enriching, as your efforts can have an immediate positive impact on the lives of the men we serve. GRTU Membership Reminder



A recently approved project at the August budget and board meeting involves GRTU contributing to an economic impact study to better understand the affect our membership has on

the local economy along the Guadalupe River. Thanks to the suggestion of Tommy Hill with GBRA a committee has been formed to determine the scope of the proposed study. A group including a representative from GBRA, New Braunfels CofC, WORD, TPWD and GRTU held its first meeting in early September. A second meeting has been scheduled in early October to include the consultant Jerry Walker with Impact Data Source. Bids are being completed as the scope of this study is honed by all parties. All representatives present at the meeting determined this report when complete will have exponential value. Equating in dollars and cents the impact of a body of water and the importance of its flows should be an enabling piece of the puzzle as we move forward.

More reports will follow as plans are finalized.
